

Last fall, in collaboration with the
Foundation for Environmental Stewardship
(FES), HCAS-DCRS introduced the
Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)
Launch initiative. Its purpose was to raise
awareness regarding the SDGs, which
serve a global framework for addressing
humanity's most urgent challenges.

Participants in the SDGs Launch program gained a comprehensive understanding of the UN's 17 SDGs and also acquired the knowledge and skills needed to develop localized projects aimed at advancing the goals. Moreover, they were empowered to be catalysts for change by crafting innovative solutions for sustainable development. We maintain ongoing engagement with program participants, nurturing a vibrant community of change agents committed to driving SDG progress.

The program had two components, an inperson workshop and online asynchronous modules. We had 77 participants in the inperson workshop and 150 participants overall. We had the participation of undergraduate and graduate student clubs and working groups, as well as the presence of the Student Affairs and International Affairs Office. The UN Association of Broward County attended and delivered valuable insights into their organization and initiatives..

This event was part of the UN Global
Week to #Act4SDGs, 2022, a pivotal
occasion dedicated to expediting actions
for the SDGs. With over 130 million actions
spanning across 190 countries and
territories, this was the most extensive
mobilization effort ever witnessed during a
Global Week to #Act4SDGs.

Workshop on Participatory Methods for SD

VILCABAMBA: THE VALLEY OF LONGEVITY




Dr. Elena Bastidas, along with six doctoral students and two alumni from DCRS, recently engaged in an interdisciplinary, field-based training program focused on participatory research for conflict transformation. This workshop was conducted in collaboration with The Perspectives of Freedom Foundation (POF) and Fundaminga Foundation. Its primary objective was to enhance the research capabilities of conflict resolution experts, enabling them to conduct participatory research that fosters sustainable interventions. The experiential training took place in Vilcabamba Ecuador. Following is a summary of the case study participants engaged with.

Vilcabamba derives its name from two words originating from the Quechua language: "huilco," which means tree, and "bamba,"



which means valley. Translated into Spanish, this is interpreted as "valley of the sacred tree." However, due to its most notable feature, it is also known as the "valley of longevity." Vilcabamba is currently an exceptional and living expression of an ancient peasant culture from the tropical Andes. It represents a way of living and sharing life, but in the present, it is undergoing a spontaneous process of reinventing the social and cultural relationships that make up its tradition. This process occurs in the midst of a diverse and complex situation marked by environmental, economic, demographic, and social phenomena that require in-depth analysis and understanding to anticipate possible conflicts that may arise or intensify due to this dynamic and complex reality.

With this in mind, we believe that to adequately understand the current situation in Vilcabamba, it is essential to promote pedagogical and creative processes of participatory action research involving various sectors of the population, in collaboration with local and provincial institutions. The goal is to develop a strategy that allows for a more comprehensive analysis of the issues at hand and to recognize how it affects the territory, identity, and culture of Vilcabamba. In this way, we can identify, strengthen, or recreate coexistence relationships for the future wellbeing of the new generations. Students used participatory tools like the Sondeo, participant observation, mapping, interviews, stake holder analysis and principles of social polygraphy during the experiential learning process.
