Each RI session has an 11-digit number called a Meeting ID that will be required to join. Find the number on the RI schedule under Zoom Meeting ID.

See below for quick tips on joining the meeting from a computer, your mobile app, or telephonically.

<u>Important</u>: For participation confirmation purposes, when you join the meeting, make sure the display name is your actual first and last name. The Zoom sessions may have a waiting room function and your name is important so the session organizer can let you into the meeting.

On your computer or on your mobile device using the Zoom application:

To join a Zoom meeting on a computer or mobile device, download the Zoom app from Zoom download center: https://zoom.us/download

- Open the Zoom desktop (or mobile) application
- Click Join a Meeting
- Enter the **Meeting ID** from the RI schedule

Africa Working Group: Round Table Discussion on Critical Race Theory: Fact vs. Fiction.

Presenters: Colina Cole, Yola Menard-Saint Clair & Angela Hamann

Critical Race Theory (CRT) is a theoretical framework that examines the impact of race on U.S. institutions and how the legal system established, maintained, and proactively disadvantaged people of color economically and socially while simultaneously protecting white majority ideology. How do we reconcile our past in a way that heals and transforms race relations in the U.S.? So misunderstood and feared, CRT has become so controversial elected officials in nine states, including Florida, have created legislation prohibiting its teachings in public schools from K-12. However, not all the laws explicitly state CRT. Instead, some bans prohibit training that focuses on cultural awareness and unconscious bias education to dismantle privilege, oppression, and various forms of discrimination. Today, Africa Working Group (AWG) hosts a student panel to confront misinformation, disinformation, and alternative facts associated with CRT discourse. Furthermore, AWG will explore the theory through the lens of collective memories, education, and social inequality in historic preservation in Jacksonville, Florida.

Structural Violence and Popular Protest in Latin America.

Presenter: Dr. Mezilas; moderated by Roland Joseph

In this seminar, Structural Violence and Popular Protest in Latin America, Dr. Mezilas will analyze the different forms of popular protest against structural violence in this region, using the critical social thought of Latin America. Contrary to the mainstream Western tradition, the social conflict and the popular protest in Latin America are intrinsically related to the mode of political institutionalization of Latin America, where the state apparatus is at the service of some oligarchic and hegemonic groups. This presentation is threefold. First, it will clarify and analyze the relationship between structural violence and political protest throughout Latin American history. First, will highlight some aspects of Latin American social thought regarding social domination and inequalities. The third will focus on some concrete popular protests and their impacts on the political change since the beginning of the 21st century.

Dr. Glodel Mezilas is a researcher and professor at the State University of Haiti and the University Institute of Sciences. His research focuses on Latin American and Caribbean studies, especially international politics, populism, democracy, and social movements. He is also deputy director of the master's program at the Diplomatic Academy of the Haitian Chancellery. He presented at conferences locally and internationally, including the United States, Spain, Argentina, Mexico, and France. He has published 18 academic articles and 12 books. Most of them are related to Latin American and Caribbean studies. Dr. Mezilas holds a Ph.D. in Latin American studies from the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México (UNAM), a master's degree in International Studies from the Complutense Universidad de Madrid, and two bachelor's degrees in Political Science and Modern Letters from Haitian Universities, a specialization in International Public Function from the National School of Administration of Paris (ENA), and a postgraduate degree in Diplomacy in International Politics of Academic School of Madrid.

Bio: Dr. Otto F. von Feigenblatt

Ambassador Otto F. von Feigenblatt is an academician of the Royal Academy of Doctors of Spain, the Royal Academy of Economics and Financial Sciences of Spain, and the Royal Spanish Academy of the Sea. He was knighted by King Phillip VI of Spain with the Royal Order of Isabella the Catholic for his contributions to the social sciences and to the study of leadership in Spain and in Latin America. Ambassador von Feigenblatt received the title of "Honorary Ambassador of the Republic of Kosovo" from the President of Kosovo for his contributions to the fields of development studies and peace studies. His research is interdisciplinary, and he holds multiple earned doctorates and has received nine honorary doctorates for his research and service. He is currently serving as a Visiting Fellow at the International College of Mahidol University (Thailand). His research focuses on the nexus between management and international development with a focus on applied anthropology.

Global Practicum: Ecuador Summer 2022: Sustainable Development and Conflict Transformation.

The course provides the theoretical and practical skills to understand the interaction between sustainable development and conflict transformation. As part of the course, students travel to Ecuador. The journey starts in the capital, Quito, where they interact with researchers and policymakers and gain an understanding of the historical, socioeconomic, and ecological background of the country. Then, they travel to the Amazon region, one of the most bio-diverse regions in the world. Students interact with indigenous communities and experience the cultural and ecological biodiversity of the area. Finally, students travel through the Andes to the South of the country, to the Valley of Longevity, Vilcabamba. For five days, students engage in a live case study, researching the impact of immigration in the area. The data gathered is processed in the final project.
