Bio: Dr. Elaine (Lan Yin) Hsiao

Dr. Hsiao is an Assistant Professor in the School of Peace and Conflict Studies at Kent State University. She is a critical socio-legal scholar and political ecologist, integrating peace and conflict studies with transboundary conservation and protected areas, Indigenous and community governance, human rights and rights of nature, and development alternatives. Much of her work seeks to address conflicts in conservation (e.g., human-protected area conflicts, human-wildlife conflicts), conservation in places of conflict (i.e., conflict-sensitive and conflict-resilient conservation), and conflict resolution through conservation (environmental peacebuilding).

The Sahel: Violent Extremism, State Fragility, and Peacebuilding Opportunities

Featured speaker: **Nkasi Wodu**

Why is the Sahel region important? It is home to 150 million people from 10 countries combined. In 2021, the region accounted for 35% of the world's global terrorism deaths¹. Although instability in the Sahel is hardly new, emerging trends show that the region has become a hotbed for terrorist activities. At the same time, democratic institutions in some of the States in the region continue to face decline.

Presenter's Bio:

Nkasi Wodu, a peacebuilding practitioner, Global Governance and Human Security Scholar, and a Senior New Voices Fellow at the Aspen Institute, will highlight some of the emerging issues in the region and how they interact to create instability. He will also show how fallout from the instability in some of the Sahelian States have created a humanitarian crisis in neighboring countries, triggering more instability. The presentation will highlight local peacebuilding interventions showcasing the need for a multipronged approach to peacebuilding and conflict prevention based on the work of local peacebuilding actors on the ground.
