

Returning from trauma, tragedy, and loss is a difficult, but also an empowering enterprise. Historically, humanity has needed to rise from the ashes of war, disease, genocide, and social and political unrest and violence. Individuals cope on a daily basis with the effects of sexual assault, domestic abuse, and personal battles with death and despair. In the resolving stages of a global pandemic and continuing struggles of LGBTQ and BIPOC communities, it seems appropriate to consider the nature of human resiliency and what tools we use to begin anew.

How do the humanities help us to process these losses and trauma, and to regenerate, to find new hope and growth? In addition to solace and comfort, in what ways do the arts, literature, history, film, religion, and philosophy provide paths to creativity and newness, rebuilding and finding light in darkness? How can the humanities help us design and build more socially and culturally responsible technologies to help communities redress trauma, division, and violence?

Azar Nafisi is a national bestselling author, activist, and professor. Born in and raised in Iran, she was witness to the Islamic Revolution. Her acclaimed bestseller *Reading Lolita in Tehran: A Memoir in Books* portrays the Islamic revolution and the power of fiction for a professor and her students. Nafisi's *Reading Lolita in Tehran* has been translated over thirty times and has won a variety of awards. She has lectured on the effect that literature and culture on politics in places such as Oxford University. Nafisi has also lectured on the human rights of women and girls in Iran. In addition to her acclaimed bestseller, Nafisi has also published a children's book with illustrations by Sophie Benini Pietromarchi called *BiBi and the Green Voice* and a memoir focusing on her mother called *Thing I've Been Silent About: Memories of a Prodigal Daughter*.
